SUNY Broome Binghamton, New York

This agreement between Elmira College and SUNY Broome establishes the special terms and conditions under which graduates of SUNY Broome are admitted to Elmira College and the policies governing the transfer credit from SUNY Broome to Elmira College.

I. GENERAL POLICIES

- a. Elmira College accepts a maximum of sixty-eight semester hours of credit from two-year colleges.
- b. Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees:
 - Students who have received Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees from SUNY Broome will be admitted to Elmira College as Juniors.
 - ii. Recipients of these college transfer degrees will receive credit for grades of "D", provided that;
 - 1. The student has earned a cumulative grade point average of 2.00 or higher,
 - 2. The courses in which the grades were earned are applicable to the degree,
 - 3. SUNY Broome recognizes the course as a college transfer course, and
 - 4. Elmira College recognizes the course as a college transfer course (see the Elmira College Bulletin)
 - iii. Recipients of these degrees will have fulfilled Elmira College General Degree Requirements as follows:
 - 1. They will be exempt from the Elmira College First Year Seminar Requirement;
 - 2. They will have completed the Elmira College Communications Skills Program: however, every student must complete, with a passing grade, a course taken at Elmira College, from an approved list of "W" courses. This will typically be a course, taken at Elmira College, in the student's major with a special emphasis on written communication;
 - Careful selection of courses to fulfill the SUNY Broome General Education Requirements should permit a student to fulfill most of the Elmira College Distribution Requirements. SUNY Broome courses that fulfill the Elmira College Distribution Requirements are listed in Part c below.

c. Associate in Applied Science Degrees

- i. These degrees are not designed for transfer, although some courses may transfer.
- ii. Elmira College recognizes this distinction between degrees, programs and courses leading directly to employment and those that are applicable to baccalaureate degrees. At the same time, it offers degrees in some of the same disciplines. With a little careful planning, a student may select courses that meet many of the general education and major requirements of Elmira College, as well as SUNY Broome's requirements for the occupational degree. The specific course equivalents and major requirements are provided in Parts II and III, below, but the following guidelines may be useful to SUNY Broome students who are considering transferring to Elmira College

II. GENERAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

a. Communications Skills Program

Recipients of these degrees, will have completed the Elmira College Communications Skills Program, however, every student must complete, with a passing grade, a course taken at Elmira College, from an approved list of "W" courses. This will typically be a course, taken at Elmira College, in the student's major with a special emphasis on written communication.

b. "W" Course

Every student must complete, with a passing grade, a course taken at Elmira College, from an approved list of "W" courses. This will typically be a course, taken at Elmira College, in the student's major with a special emphasis on written communication.

c. Mathematical Competency and Quantitative Reasoning Requirements

The Mathematical Competency and Quantitative Reasoning requirements are designed to ensure students are prepared to handle quantitative courses at the collegiate level and have the skills necessary to apply quantitative reasoning in their lives after college.

Mathematical Competency Requirement

The Mathematical Competency requirement ensures that each student will have the appropriate foundation in Mathematical thinking for success in quantitative coursework. In order to satisfy this requirement a student must achieve an adequate score on the mathematics placement exam or take one course (usually 3 or 4 credits) of Mathematics at the college level and achieve a grade of C or better. Examples of courses that satisfy the requirement are MAT 136 (College Algebra), or any course having MAT 136 as a prerequisite

Quantitative Reasoning Requirement

The Quantitative Reasoning or (QR) requirement will expose students to developing strategies and solving problems in a structured, logical and analytical way. Students will also have the opportunity to apply these strategies to specific questions in specific disciplines. Students will take one course (usually 3 or 4 credits) beyond Mathematical Competency. Courses satisfying Quantitative Reasoning contain a significant quantitative component. These courses may come from a variety of disciplines including but not limited to Mathematics.

d. Odyssey Requirement

Liberal Education exists in many forms outside of the classroom. Experiencing live performances, academic lectures, scholarly discussions, formal debates, and art of all forms outside of the confines of the traditional classroom is essential for a liberally educated graduate. Attending and participating in such events creates graduating students who are better informed, well-rounded, and more appreciative of the world around them. Elmira College designates such educational opportunities as Odyssey events and requires all full-time undergraduate students to attend four Odyssey events in the Fall and Winter terms of each academic year they are in attendance at Elmira College, at least two of which must be performing arts events. No credit is granted for the Odyssey Requirement.

e. Physical Education and Wellness (2 activities or at least 2 credits)

Developing an understanding of the importance of physical health has always been an important component of an Elmira College education. Physical health and well-being impacts all aspects of our lives. Therefore, all full-time students must complete two approved Physical Education and Wellness courses. This requirement applies to students entering Elmira College beginning with the Fall 2014 Term.

Alternatively, participation in a Varsity sport, Junior Varsity sport, club sport or the ROTC program counts as a substitute for a Physical Education and Wellness activity or course, provided that the participation comprises at least eighteen contests, contacts, or practices.

f. Career-Related Internship

The career-related internship, which applies to all students entering Elmira College beginning with the Fall 2014 term, provides an opportunity for students to explore work experience related to the major or to potential career goals. Career-related internships may be completed any time after the sophomore year and do not receive academic credit, unless offered for credit by the student's major. No essay is required. There are multiple ways to complete the Career-Related Internship requirement:

- i. Work for a minimum of 80 hours in a pre-career or major-related environment. This work may be paid or unpaid, but must be career or major-related. Students may work with the Office of Career Services or on their own to find an appropriate career or major-related internship.
- ii. Students must complete the major specific internship if it is required by the major. Students who are completing a major that offers an internship for credit may complete their internship according to the guidelines of the major. The number of hours required for the internship may vary from major to major.
- iii. Pre-Graduate School Internship. Students who plan to go on to graduate school may work with a faculty member to write an original thesis, or produce an original body of work appropriate for their field of study. This option will require students to register for 6 credit hours. The thesis or work should result in a significant and appropriate contribution of new ideas to the field. Upon completion, students will do an oral presentation of their work to the campus community.

The Career-Related Internship is administered by the Office of Career Services. Additional information is available from the Director of Career Services.

g. Community Service Requirement

Beginning with the Class of 2017, all students are required to complete a 60 hour non-credit community service experience with a local non-profit organization before the end of their sophomore year at Elmira College. No essay is required to complete this requirement. A list of non-profits in Elmira is available from the Office of Career Services. The Office is considering eliminating the waiver option for all students, including those currently enrolled, beginning in the Fall of 2014. Additional information is available in the Office of Career Services.

h. The Pillars and World Engagement

The Pillars and World Engagement requirements provide students with the intellectual breadth in the liberal arts and sciences necessary to be a broadly educated and globally aware citizen.

Courses taken as part of a major or concentration will qualify for The Pillars. No more than 3 credit hours from the same field code may be applied unless that field code is for a language other than English

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

SUNY Broome courses with similar or identical titles to those at Elmira College are considered equivalent. Transfer credit is not granted for intercollegiate sports, although they may be used to waive a physical education activity.

Courses which can be counted toward fulfillment of the Physical Education requirement are:

# IV. SPECIAL MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

#### **ACCOUNTING**

Students who intend to transfer to Elmira and pursue an Accounting major should consult a member of the Accounting faculty at Elmira College to ensure that they enroll in the correct courses and that they understand the requirements for licensure.

#### **BIOLOGY**

BIO 111-112 General Biology I and II are the entry-level courses for this major. Students interested in the Elmira College Biology, Clinical Laboratory Science or Biology-Chemistry major should also complete CHM 145-145L and CHM 146-146L

#### **BUSINESS ADMINSTRATION**

To satisfy all but four of the core requirements in these majors, students should complete the following courses:

BUS 111 Financial Accounting

**BUS 210 Managerial Accounting** 

ECO 110 Micro-Economics

ECO 111 Introduction to Macro-Economics

BUS 118-120 Business Law I and II

BUS 246 Principles of Management

MAT 224 Statistics II

BUS 141 Marketing

The Business Administration-International Business major requires that students take 2 foreign language courses at the 3000 level. Foreign language courses would therefore help students interested in this major.

#### **CHEMISTRY**

CHM 145-145L and CHM 146-146L are the entry-level course for this major.

# **CRIMINAL JUSTICE**

Students who intend to complete the Criminal Justice major at Elmira College, should complete introductory courses in Criminal Justice, Psychology, and Sociology as well MAT 224 which is the equivalent of MAT 2090. At least fifteen credits in the major must be completed at Elmira College and at least twelve of these must be at the upper level (3000 and above).

#### **ENGLISH**

The following courses are recommended for prospective English majors:

ENG 170 Creative Writing

LIT 210 or 211 Studies in United States Literature I or II

LIT 214-215 Studies in British Literature I-II

#### FOREIGN LANGUAGE

A major in Foreign Languages at Elmira College requires completion of certain core requirements plus an area of specialization chosen from French or Spanish. Each specialization requires a minimum of 24 credits in addition to the first-year course, as specified in the Elmira College *Bulletin*. At least 12 of these credits must be at the 3000-level or higher.

Some Core Requirements and their SUNY Broome equivalents are:

A foreign language (classical or modern) different from the specialization

6 credits

Elementary French courses if the specialization is not French Elementary German courses if the specialization is not German Elementary Spanish courses if the specialization is not Spanish ITA 101-102 Beginning Italian

#### HUMAN SERVICES (INCLUDING EARLY CHILDHOOD SERVICES)

Although many courses are equivalent, the B.S. degree in these disciplines is significantly different in its structure and purposes from the A.A.S. degrees. Students who have received one of the occupational degrees should consult a member of the Elmira College Faculty to determine their status.

#### CLINICAL LABORATORY SCIENCE

Although some courses appear to be equivalent, the B.S. degree in Clinical Laboratory Science is significantly different in its structure and purposes from the A.A.S. degree in Medical Laboratory Technology. "MLT" courses cannot be accepted for credit because they are superseded by courses taken in the hospital intern program during the senior year. Students who have received the occupational degree should consult a member of the Elmira College Faculty to determine their status.

Students transferring to Elmira College are automatically reviewed for one of the College's merit based scholarships ranging from \$16,000 to \$26,000 per year, renewable at that level throughout each year of continued full-time study for the number of terms normally required to earn the baccalaureate degree. The Office of Admissions will award the scholarship at the time of acceptance based upon the student's cumulative achievement in collegiate coursework. No separate scholarship application is required.
